Introducing a new regional representative: Shirley Bustard

Originally from Northern Ireland, I graduated from the 4-year BSc (Hons) degree at North East London Polytechnic and the London Hospital, Whitechapel, in 1986 (Fig. 1). During that time, I had my first introduction to obstetrics and gynaecology on placement with Mrs Jill Mantle at the London. My first job was at Greenwich Hospital on junior rotations, and being interested in paediatrics, I worked as a senior II physiotherapist at Charlton Park School, London. Living in East London, I was lucky to be in an area under Dr Wendy Savage's care, and was offered a home birth for my son. It was this wonderful experience that fired my enthusiasm for childbirth education.

My current post in women's health has always been part-time, so I have combined it with other areas, and I am currently working as a university tutor, visiting students on placement.

I work at the University Hospital, North Durham, and also at the more rural Shotley Bridge Hospital. Over the past 17 years, I have developed the post to clinical specialist level. I completed the Association of Chartered Physiotherapists in Obstetrics and Gynaecology (now ACPWH) course at Glasgow in 1993, and was privileged to be awarded the Anne Bird Prize.

I really enjoy clinical work and the positive benefits that it can have on women's lives. I aim to pass this enthusiasm on when I lecture to students at Northumbria University, Newcastle upon Tyne, which I do yearly. I am involved in musculoskeletal obstetrics and female continence in both inpatient and outpatient settings. I have a strong commitment to audit and education, and I have been involved in many projects over the years, including a support group for women post-hysterectomy in rural areas and working with Sure Start.

On a personal level, I really enjoy being a mum, being in the countryside and creative photography (I have passed my A-level!). I have
