International contacts

As Secretary of the International Organization of Physical Therapists in Women's Health (IOPTWH), I am often the first point of contact for enquiries. These can either come from within our member organizations, or from physiotherapists in non-member countries. I handle regular enquiries from physiotherapists looking for clinicians in another country to which a patient is travelling. Recent examples include requests for information about women's health or pelvic physiotherapists in France, Romania, Abu Dhabi, Italy, India, Japan and Switzerland. Although none of these countries are members, I do know of women's health physiotherapists in four of the seven, so at least I can offer some contact information. In addition, recent enquiries from within the membership include topics such as treatment codes and a policy to propose pelvic floor muscle rehabilitation for every woman postnatally.

If you are ever asked about women's health physiotherapists in another country, check the membership page of the IOPTWH website (www.ioptwh.org/members/map.cfm) to see if it is a member organization. If so, you can contact a delegate or delegates within that country, and you may even find a link to their organization's website.
